## From the Pastor's Study...

After all this is over, what will you have missed the most?

I'm not going to try to make a list, but after many weeks of staying at home, not being able to go out where I want, having baseball taken away, and basically speaking to just one breathing human being (albeit a good one to speak with!), no church filled (or even half-filled) with people has to be near the top of that list.

And I'm not even thinking just about worship, either. What else is there?

Conversation. The way we "do" church on Sundays allows plenty of time for that. It's the conversations that offer compliments about a sermon (all too rare, but maybe that's why they're memorable), or updates on family situations, or the day's Sunday school discussion, the jokes (and I thought I could go a while without Wayne telling one!), the confessions on the side about a problem one of you is having, even the gossipy rumors—as long as they're not aimed at hurting anybody, of course. "Let no evil come out of your mouths," Paul advises, "but only what is useful for building up, as there is need, so that your words may give grace to those who hear." Boy am I in need right about now....

We have an early service, then there's food and talk, sometimes more of one than the other, then Sunday School where more conversation can take place—it all builds up and gives grace. Even some of the more salacious ones. Our greatest living Baptist historian is Bill Leonard, and he wrote (on the morning I wrote this) of an Appalachian who said, "In our church we 'love one another' like Jesus taught. We reach out to each other with the right hand of Christian fellowship and the laying on of hands. We used to give each other the kiss of peace, but some people got to lingering a little, so we had to give it up!" That's maybe not a 'best practice' in the Covid era, but substitute some conversations in there and my point is made.

When I was leaving a gypsy village in Romania my first day there, one of my hosts, Florin, was driving me back to the city. Some of the ladies involved in the ministry were in the back of the van because they were planning food for an event that night where I would be speaking in another village. As they spoke animatedly, Florin summed up the gossip for me (as it was in Romanian, I had no clue): "There's a 78-year old man in our church that lost his wife a while back." I felt like the discussion didn't match the sad nature of what he was saying, and I was right.

"They're not talking about that. He's not sad at all, now. It's been a year-and-a half. No, he's got a 42-year old girlfriend now. What do you think about that?" The mood brightened, I admit the devil was lurking near my passenger seat. My answer was, "I wish you would ask him what vitamins he's using so I can get a barrel." He burst out laughing and translated back into Romanian. Mirth poured out into the road.

Is it any wonder I miss it?

# **Quarantined!!**


