

From the Pastor's Study...

"Two men," Jesus said, *"went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector."* When Jesus pairs up people in his parables, he's drawing a distinction between them. The Pharisee prayed, *"God, I thank you that I was praying thus, 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people, thieves, rogues, adulterers, or even this tax collector."*

He's not praising this Pharisee's willingness to pray, just what he had to say. Jesus puts the focus on this religious figure, a temple official, who compares himself to a man of a universally reviled profession. Rabbis back then often made the same comparison, contrasting the pious (like the Pharisees) with someone that represented sin in the form of a traitor to the whole nation, like tax collectors that worked for Rome.

When in our prayer life, we make comparisons to the circumstances of others, we are doing no less than the Pharisee. A great teacher of preaching, Fred Craddock, told a story about a group that invited him to join them for one of their meetings soon after he took over a new church. He was always wary of such groups, but he decided he would attend the meeting of this "prayer" group. When he got there, he was dumbfounded to see that all they did was offer thanks for the things they were able to buy due to their good fortune—cars, jewelry, clothes—and contrast themselves to others less fortunate. (I've always said, the Pharisees are still with us!)

There is much that is wrong in making such statements in a prayer. We should not draw attention to the things we have that create a distinction between ourselves, and those that are less fortunate.

We should instead draw attention to the rich blessings that are available for us all in the things we can see every day. There is much that is "rich" in those blessings, and they are usually "free." Strive each day, from today forward, to compare the blessings you see each day, to the blessings you already have.

That's right (cue the music) — "e-lim-inate, the negative, ac-cen-tuate, the positive...."



The house of my soul is too small for you to enter; make it more spacious by your coming. It lies in ruins; rebuild it. Some things are to be found there which will offend your gaze; I confess this to be so and know it well. But who will clean my house? To whom but yourself can I cry?



Ingredients

- 1 (8-ounce) package cream cheese, room temperature
- 1/2 cup creamy peanut butter
- · 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1 1/2 cups powdered sugar
- 1 (12.5-ounce) bag fun-sized butterfinger bars, crushed (reserve 2 bars to sprinkle on top)
- 1 (8-ounce) container Cool Whip, thawed
- 1 store-bought oreo or chocolate graham cracker crust

Instructions

- 1. Beat cream cheese and peanut butter with an electric mixer until smooth.
- 2. Mix in vanilla.
- 3. Beat in powdered sugar until smooth.
- 4. Fold in crushed butterfingers.
- 5. Fold in Cool Whip.
- 6. Spread filling in crust. Sprinkle reserved butterfingers on top.
- 7. Refrigerate at least 4 hours before serving.
