Mission Opportunities through Baptist Goshen Association (BGAV)


- Disaster Response Baby Boxes Part of the BGAV's new disaster response program for supply distribution, Goshen is collecting supplies to fill 240 baby boxes so families can have the essentials to care for their baby during a crisis. This is a brand new idea and Goshen is the first to put together these needed supplies. Plans are to pack boxes in the spring (depending on donations) to be prepared for hurricane season 2023. The boxes (will be provided) are to contain: a tube of Desitin (4 -ounce), 1 pacifier (in packaging), 1 bottle (8-ounce in packaging), 1 blanket, 1 sm. box of disposable diaper sacks or 4 gal trash bags, 3 packs of unscented wipes (50-100 count each), 2 packs of name brand diapers (25-35 depending on size). Each year we support the Alma Hunt Mission Offering, but who was Alma Hunt?

Alma Hunt (October 5, 1909 – June 14, 2008) was executive secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention Woman's Missionary Union (WMU) from 1948 to 1974. She was born in Roanoke, Virginia and was an ordained minister of the Rosalind Hills Baptist Church where she vocally opposed the Southern Baptist Convention's prohibition of women in the role of church pastors or military and prison chaplains.

One of Hunt's first initiatives after being chosen to head the WMU was to support the formation of the women's department of the Baptist World Alliance, and also the BWA's interdenominational North American Baptist Women's Union. Among other things, from 1976 to 1985, Hunt served as consultant on women's mission work for the Baptist Foreign Mission Board which named her an honorary emeritus missionary in 1987. In 1998, the WMU of Virginia and the Baptist General Association of Virginia named the Alma

This month we are spotlighting Pastor Mickey's infamous baked beans.

Fay's Baked Beans

Ingredients:

5-6 cans of beans in combination to suit your preference, drained and rinsed Baked or barbecue beans (mostly) Cannelloni Black Beans

Barbecue sauce Worcestershire sauce Ketchup Mustard Brown Sugar, optional Molasses, optional

Tbl Olive oil
Onion, medium, chopped
Green pepper, chopped
Garlic to taste, optional

To the extent one person "taught" me to cook, I would have to credit my Mother, whose name was Fay. Other than that, for me there has been a lot of trial-and-error She, Emeril, and others, though, encouraged me to use a "freestyle" approach, so whatever feels good to you is fine for this recipe. This is a bit of a variation of what she taught me.

Rinse and combine the beans in a large bowl. To this add the barbecue sauce, Worcestershire sauce, ketchup, and mustard. Optional additions are brown sugar or molasses, depending on your sweet tooth. It just depends on what you are trying to do with it, and your personal taste.

In a frying pan at a medium temperature, saute the chopped onion and green pepper(s) until soft. If desired, add garlic just before removing, (so it doesn't burn). Add this mixture to the beans.

Place the bean mixture in one or two baking dishes. Cover with thick-cut bacon. (Note that during baking, the bacon will shrink, so pack it on top.

Bake at 350 - 375 degrees depending on your oven for about 45 minutes, or until the bacon is clearly done. Place a cookie sheet under your baking dish if you think it might boil over.


We're fast approaching our second Elk Creek Blood Drive. We had a fantastic 31 units donated at our last drive, with 49% of donations being first time donors.

Note: If you are a regular donor, there is a 60 day wait time between donations so please plan accordingly.




STEPS for signing up:

- 1. Go to redcrossblood.org
- 2. Enter 23024 in "find a blood drive". Click blue arrow




5. Choose your time. "Blood" is a traditional donation. "Power Red" is similar to a whole blood donation, except a special machine is used to allow you to safely donate two units of red blood cells during one donation





4. Select "See Times" next to Elk Creek Baptist Church



while returning your plasma and platelets to you. It takes about 30 minutes longer than a normal donation.

6. Then you either sign in, or create an account if you haven't done this before. The steps are straight forward.
