The RuraLove Thrift Store is open to the public to purchase clothing and yard sale items on Wednesdays (year-round) and the first Saturday of the month April-November from 8-12:30. In the past month (through your contributions and donations to RuraLove) you have helped local families in crisis by providing:

15 Families with financial needs (10,019.00)

(Rent, Mortgage, Utilities)

- 5 Families with household needs
- Families with whole household needs
- Families with a medical equipment loan
- 806 volunteer hours were donated in August with the average of 10-12 volunteers on Mondays (sorting) and 18-22 volunteers each Wednesday (sale day).

In August volunteers made:

- 2 delivery of donated items
- 3 deliveries of purchased items
- 5 pick ups of donations
- 307 total miles driven for pick ups and deliveries
- Received \$196.00 for recycling metal
- Received \$142 in donations from our guests throughout the month and \$30 in delivery fees.

Have you ever considered being a driver or helper on one of the RuraLove vehi-

cles? RuraLove has experienced increased requests for picking up donated items and deliveries and could still use more volunteers. If you would consider this, it would help out tremendously. Please call 540.894.8440 and a coordinator will return your call.

RuraLove was recently blessed with the addition of a 2018 Hino box truck with a lift gate. The truck was able to be purchased due to a \$22,000 donation from Richard and Joyce Myers (who attend Elk Creek Baptist) toward the purchase price. The Myers donated the funds in



memory of their daughter, Karen J. Myers. Joyce asked that the truck be named "Elmo" and generously gave her late daughter's own stuffed Elmo (which is now seat-belted in) to ride along with each delivery and pick up. Elmo joins the small fleet along with "Big Bird," "Kermit," and "Snuffleupagus" and a pick-up needing to be named. We were very blessed that Enterprise worked with us on the purchase of the truck because they learned and understood the mission of RuraLove.



"A word with Dee"

There is no doubt that churches in the United States are struggling these days. Very few churches are growing in attendance. In fact, most churches are trying to keep their attendance from declining. The primary element that is missing is the presence of a vibrant, God-given vision. Jesus provided the church with such a vision when he told his

disciples to "go and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. 20) Teach these new disciples to obey all the commands I have given you. And be sure of this: I am with you always, even to the end of the age." (Matthew 28: 19-20)

Every church needs to prayerfully decide how they intend to put that vision into action. What is their specific plan for carrying out the "great commission?" The pastor and the key leaders within the congregation have the responsibility to make sure that their church has a specific vision from the Lord. Then, they need to make certain that they activate that vision...

For instance, maybe the primary vision for a specific church is to reach the young families in their community for Christ. Another church might decide to pour their energy into reaching senior adults for Jesus. A third church might choose to adopt a small village in Africa and reach people for Christ in that village and, at the same time, reach people in their own community who are excited about this vision. Every church has to have a practical vision and a simple plan for carrying out that vision.

Andy Stanley, pastor of North Point Community Church in Atlanta, wrote an excellent book entitled, "Making Vision Stick." In this very brief book, Stanley says that "one of the greatest challenges of leadership is making vision stick. Vision doesn't have much adhesive." Then, the entire book is an explanation of how to significantly increase the "adhesiveness" of your church's vision. Stanley says that there are five basic things that church leaders need to do: 1) state the vision simply; 2) cast the vision convincingly; 3) repeat the vision regularly; 4) celebrate the vision systematically; and 5) embrace the vision personally.

There is no doubt that with a God-given vision and with the power of God's Spirit, your church (regardless of size) can make an impact for Jesus Christ within your community and around the world. ~ Dee

Kris Hutchinson (Mineral Baptist), Team Leader:

People ask me all the time, "Why would you want to go on an international mission trip?" My usual response is "Why not?"

Armenia was amazing. I am always amazed at how the family of God works. No matter where in the world, literally, you go, the bond between believers is almost instantaneous. This was especially evident during our time in Sisian with

Vardan and Lucine. Hearing their stories and their heart for Christ and the work that needs to be done in their area is captivating, inspiring, and heart breaking all at the same time.

People are hungry for Christ. Kids shout His praises. The churches want to reach the next generation hence our construction project building walls for a future youth center and Sunday School classrooms. All who would have ever though a game of musical chairs would be so eventful? And who would have thought that a simple smile and "double point" gesture would create a bond between people thousands of miles away? Oh, and by the way, *Hallelujah* and *Amen* translate really easily into Armenian.

Kim Rosson (Oakland Baptist): I had no idea what God had in store for me when I arrived in Armenia. Travelling 7,000 miles away from home, there was no way to know what we were going to experience in the way of culture and communicating with the Armenian people. God gave us two incredible young ladies that translated and explained so many things to us—we were truly blessed from the beginning. The churches we visited were open, loving, and receptive to our Bible stories and activities.

I think what touched me most was that the adults and children we interacted with truly love God, no matter were they live and what language they speak—we all speak the same language—the word of God. I was truly blessed to be part of this team and the opportunity that God gave me to experience His love and compassion half-way across the other side of the world.

The construction part of the Mission Team laid about 200 block to help create a youth room in the attic level of a church in the capital city of Armenia. There are two congregations that use this church building at different times.



Cathrine Young-Turgal (Antioch Baptist): The biggest highlight of my mission trip was Vacation Bible School. The children were eager to learn and their singing with motions was so wonderful to listen and watch the actions. I could have listened to them all

day. From the tunes they were singing, I knew some of the songs such as "If You're Happy and You Know It." I brought an old familiar classic "Jesus Loves Me" for the children to learn in English. On the last day of Vacation Bible School at the Maranata Church: we were asked to leave the room because the children were preparing a surprise for us. They sang with motions, "Jesus Loves

brought tears to my eyes.

Tucker Swanson (Louisa Baptist): Learning about the Armenia people and the world around them was very interesting. The Genocide Museum just outside of the capital city was very moving to me. The construction team worked in a shared church building in the capital city on the third floor where we were laying block to help start the creation of a youth hang-out room. Behind the block we laid, they would use as storage in the part where the eaves are too low for other uses. On the second floor of that church, there

was a kitchen and classrooms and they were in need of bathrooms on that floor. We were able to purchase all the materials to finish the bathrooms and the items were delivered the next day.

We also traveled to Sisian to check out their needs. While there, some work was done to the landscaping and we were able to help with some future upgrades. The team was blessed to be able to meet each of the three

church planters that the people of Goshen have been supporting along with their families.

Kelly Taylor (Mineral Baptist): Mission trips are my favorite way to see the world because you get to know "people" in the plac-

> es and means in which they live. Armenians in global politics are seeking justice for genocide a century ago. Armenians in local churches have different struggles than we do here in America. All the churches I saw were beautiful stone buildings, several still under construction in the upper floors while the lower floors are used for worship and teaching. The hospitality was warm and wonderful! One church even offered translation devices with the pastor's daughter providing real-time translation of the presentations and prayers into English. It was the exception, but the heart for hospitality was every-

Me" in perfect English. It was so magnificently breathtaking that it The construction team laid about 200 cinderblock in four days to prepare a third floor for classroom space, and they filled a second level classroom concrete floor divots with mortar to level the floor in prep for laminate flooring. While at the church in Sisian, the construction team, along with Arkaty (our bus driver), helped to clear the church orchard of weeds while VBS was conducted inside the church building. The Sisian Baptist Church is close to a war zone in every context, and Pastor Vardan and Lucine have been struggling to maintain a Christian presence there. The church windows have been broken out 13 times during their tenure!

My thanks to Goshen Association, who not only supported our

ravel, did the planning, made the trip possible, and also helps coordinate supporting three church planters in Armenia. In addition, funding was donated to purchase materials, tools, and help with urgent needs. An abundant supply of yarn was donated to the women's group in Sisian. All because of the cooperative efforts of the generous people and churches in Goshen.



Please continue to pray for our church planters in Armenia. Pastor Avo, Pastor Svin, & Pastor Vardan depend on our prayers and support.

Congratulations to Brittany and Dani Garton on the birth of their second daughter, Adalyn. Adalyn was welcomed home by her big sister, Maya. Brittany is from Gordonsville Baptist Church and has been living full-time and working as a missionary in Bucharest, Romania with Project Ruth since June of 2011.

Project Ruth helps the very poor Roma children get an education through the 8th grade, and works with Roma families in many areas such as a medical clinic, dental and eye clinics, a clothing closet, adult education classes, Bible classes and more... all as a Christian Ministry while meeting basic human needs.

Goshen has a mission opportunity each summer to collect funds to purchase warm coats, hats, gloves, and shoes for each child at the Ruth School. This year Goshen is sending \$2,200.

Brittany first went to work with Project Ruth on a Goshen-led Mission Team when she was 13 years old. The Roma have held a special place in her heart ever since as she went back summer after summer until she graduated from college and moved there to minister.
